Sustainable development in business

Problem: Collaboration between private and public actors, International practices and tendencies.

Perspectives gained: External partners and their roles in driving sustainable development.

Results/findings in the two groups:

Language and international studies (LISE) group: The strongest stakeholders in H&M group (policy makers, NIACE and customers) take responsibility for sustainable development in different ways. All stakeholders can better utilise their salience. A collaborative approach is recommended.

<u>Urban-, environmental- and energy planning (EP) group:</u> SMEs find it difficult to incorporate the SDGs in their business model, different prerequisites affects their approach. It is found that external guidance is required for the SMEs to ensure their pivotal role. Group members: Alberte Rørbæk and Sofie Nygaard

Joint result:

Both groups investigated private companies and their sustainable development practices. Our joined results show that sustainable development in companies require the help of external partners in order to create systemic change. This is also the case internationally where external partners need to collaborate both with the companies but also with each other.

SDGs and how they are affected:

The SDGs have been a key component in both projects, as a frame to define sustainable development and as an analytical framework on sustainable business models

LISE group:

- Conducting primary research in the supply chain of H&M group.

EP group:

- Apply the generic framework to a specific industry to assist companies

<u>Joined challenges:</u> Requires more time and resources as well as security clearance and general collaboration in order to investigate specific companies

Joined further work: Use the generic framework of investigating industries as well as the challenges in the different stakeholder groups and apply them to other industries or other companies in order to investigate whether the frameworks can be used in a universal manner.


